But when Anna thought about how wonderful it would be to see the promised Savior, it became easier to wait. She was so excited for when that day would finally come!

One day, Simeon went to the temple to worship God. It was a busy day in God's house, and there were people everywhere. Simeon saw Anna in her usual place praying to God just as she did every day.

Simeon also saw moms and dads bringing their children to God's temple. Simeon had seen many babies in his life, but something deep inside made him want to see a particular baby whose parents were coming through the temple gate. Simeon went closer. When he looked at Mary's face and peeked at baby Jesus, Simeon knew his waiting was over at last. It was Jesus, God's promised Savior! Simeon was so happy. He asked Mary if he could hold her baby. 

Tell about a time you lost something that you loved. Move back 1 space.




Jesus taught the temple leaders. Move forward 1 space. What snack would you serve Jesus if he were visiting? Move forward 1 space.

 Louds covered the moon and it became very dark. A fierce wind howled and blew giant weres against their little boat!


