





Los Tres Reyes

For people in Puerto Rico and many Latin American countries, January 6 is a festive day to remember the wise men who came to give their gifts to Jesus. Although the Bible does not tell us how many there were, or even if they were kings, tradition says there were three wise men called Melchior, Balthasar, and Gaspar. That's why this special holy day is called "Los Tres Reyes" or "The Three Kings."

On the night of January 5, children might put bowls of water and boxes filled with straw by their beds for the wise men's camels or horses. Or they might put their shoes just outside their doors for the wise men to fill. The next morning, they get up early to find the boxes or shoes filled with surprises! Then the whole family prepares a special meal that might include a roasted pig, rice dishes, and special banana treats.

By saving the excitement of opening toys and other fun presents for Los Tres Reyes, children have more time to think about the birth of Jesus on Christmas Day. So for many Christians, Los Tres Reyes is a day that helps them remember the true meaning of Christmas.



Dear Family:

Today we learned how the wise men found and worshiped the new King. Continue the celebration as you read the story poem. Then read "Los Tres Reyes" and share with your child the exciting realization that Christians all over the world are celebrating Christ's birth! 


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
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On the Way Home

Today we continued to celebrate Jesus' power—this time, his power over death! Because Jesus is God's Son, we can look forward to a wonderful life in heaven with him one day! Read the story together here, then find the symbol in your God's Big Story cards and do one of the activities. Tic-Tac-Toe is also a fun family game to play, two at a time.

Let's Play Tic-Tac-Toe!

Here's what you need:

Several coins (one person uses heads and the other tails) or buttons in two different colors.

Here's what you do:

When you play "Name That Person" the oldest player begins.

When you play "Wondering" the youngest player begins.

The first person chooses a square, and answers the question that goes with the number on the square. If correct, the player lays down the coin. If wrong, the player misses a turn. Then the second player takes a turn. The game is over when one person gets three coins in a row.




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Dear Family:





Reading with Fingertips

In 1824 a fifteen-year-old French boy named Louis Braille developed a way for people who are blind to read. Braille uses a pattern of raised dots for each letter of the alphabet. People who are blind use their fingertips to "read" the dots—just as you use your eyes to read the letters that spell words.

Louis became blind in an accident when he was only three years old. He became a very good student at a school for people who are blind in Paris. When he grew up, he taught at the same school. He also became a church organist.
